

LeadsOnlabs leads to methamphetamine lab

BEEBE – The **LeadsOnlabs** computer program lead to the discovery of a methamphetamine lab.

Police Chief Wayne Ballew said Lonoke County Investigators Lieutenant Jim Kulesa and Keith Eaton received a tip concerning the manufacturing of meth

Monday via , an electronic monitoring program connecting store computers with detectives. The lead revealed that Tracy Van Winkle, 36 also know as Tracy Sumler, was making frequent purchases of pseudoephedrine from various stores.

Further investigation lead investigators to an address in the city of Beebe. On Tuesday about 11:15a.m., Investigator John Chappell of the Beebe Police Department accompanied Kulesa and Eaton to 111 Green Meadows Lane, where they located and seized glassware, chemicals components and paraphernalia utilized in the manufacture of meth. Some of the lab components were concealed in a hole in the residence floor and behind a wall panel.

Investigators from the White County Drug Task Force responded and processed the scene. Located and arrested at the scene were VanWinkle, Shelly Crowder, 29 Ronnie Steve Carson, 42, and Jason Harrington, 29. VanWinkle had outstanding arrest warrants from North Little Rock Police Department and War Police Department. Harrington had an active parole warrant. Parole/probation offices from White County responded to the scene.

The four were charged with conspiracy to manufacture a controlled substance, possession of paraphernalia to manufacture and possession of drug paraphernalia.

The subjects were transported to the White County Detention Facility.
